OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Dear Supporters of CASA for Children,

While I have been the CASA for Children Executive Director for nearly a decade, I have never felt more grateful for our community, as I have these past few years.

At the beginning of the pandemic, we had no idea how difficult it would be to make sure the children we serve would continue to be seen and heard. As we already knew, the Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA) was the one person that children in care could count on to stay connected to them, and we were committed to making sure that did not change. Not only did most of our CASAs stay on their cases, but many of them chose to take on a second case, as due to Covid, fewer new recruits were volunteering to become CASAs.

Prior to the pandemic, our annual CASA for Children auction was one of the largest and most successful in Portland, but in 2020, we had to pivot to a virtual event.

We did not know how we would meet our full budget that year, but - thanks to the generous support from our community - we were not only able to keep all of our team members in place, but actually hire for positions that were vacant prior to the pandemic. The outpouring of support was incredible, and yet not surprising.

CASA for Children has been serving children in foster care for over 30 years. It should be no surprise that when things got difficult, our donors and friends stepped in and stepped up in support of our most vulnerable local children in need.

This has been a very humbling few years, for all of us. Far more than the struggle, what will truly be remembered by our team and our CASAs, is the amount of care and support we received from our community.

In my short tenure, CASA For Children returned to an in-office, post-pandemic hybrid workforce where we:

- Revamped a DEI Committee to include board members, community members & staff.
- Changed the monthly staff meeting to have a DEI focus.
- Added a second trainer position for the antibias/cultural competency Knowing Who You Are (KWYA) Training.
- Restarted our in-person KWYA training, consisting of staff, CASAs, community, and court officers.
- Reconfigured court reports to include a more detailed cultural competency section supporting children's racial/ethnic backgrounds.

GET TO KNOW CASA FOR CHILDREN, BOARD PRESIDENT, JUSTIN PALFREYMAN



What inspired you to join the board of directors for CASA for Children?

As a CASA volunteer in Seattle over 20 years ago, I was able to experience firsthand the positive impact that a CASA can have on children's lives. I joined the board of CASA for children because of my understanding of the impact CASAs have, and I was particularly impressed with CASA for Children (serving Multnomah, Washington, Columbia, and now Tillamook counties) and the foresight, passion, and commitment of its staff and its volunteers.

How have you seen CASA for Children make a difference in the lives of children in foster care?

CASA for Children plays such a critical role as the "eyes and ears of the court" directly advocating for children in foster care. I have observed numerous situations where CASA for Children's advocacy has led to a safer home and temporary living environments for children, custody decisions that are better informed, and foster care transitions that are less disruptive for children due to CASA care and involvement.

What have been some of the biggest challenges that you've seen during your time as board president?

Some of our biggest challenges are familiar to many organizations, including retaining and recruiting staff in a tight and inflationary labor market, navigating the pandemic-related disruptions over the past couple of years, and ensuring stable funding that helps support our long-term plans. Other challenges are more specific to our work, including coordinating effectively with state agencies and the justice system to ensure appropriate CASA representation for foster children.

JUSTIN PALFREYMAN

What are the current needs of the organization?

We are seeking to get a larger portion of our funding from the State, with greater ongoing certainty so we can make long-term plans to meet the needs of the communities we serve. We are also seeking greater CASA volunteer and board member involvement from diverse and historically underrepresented communities as we strive to ensure a volunteer base and leadership team that closely aligns with the children we serve.

What are 3 words that come to mind when you think of CASA for Children?

Is there anything else you want to share with the community?

The last few years have been hard and disruptive for everyone, particularly for children in the foster care system. The long-term impacts the pandemic has had on these children are still not fully understood and will have significant ramifications on many of the key interrelated issues of our time, such as mental health, violence, housing security, and inequality. Our combined commitment to supporting these kids helps address all of these issues and is therefore one of the best investments we can make in the future of our communities.





THE POWER OF A CASA A TEEN STORY



In early 2020, 13-year-old Elliott came into foster care due to ongoing safety concerns in his family's home. The timing of this was weeks prior to the COVID-19 pandemic and the shutdown in Oregon. As a result, Elliott was placed in a group home due to the lack of placements available for teenagers. The CASA, Alex, was assigned shortly following the court appointing the case to our agency. Alex immediately started making calls to legal parties to introduce himself and his role in the case. He also connected with the first of many ODHS caseworkers assigned to the family's case, in order to help facilitate a placement for Elliott. Alex diligently worked to build rapport with him, primarily through virtual visits and phone calls due to the group home's pandemic visiting limitations. As a CASA, he knew the importance of getting to know Elliot well in order to best advocate on his behalf.



Alex was particularly drawn to working with teenagers because he saw hope in encouraging a teen to find their voice and be able to advocate for themselves later in life.

Elliott remained in the group home for about three months. During this time, Alex advocated for appropriate supports to help him process past trauma, including finding a therapist for Elliott. Alex also ensured he did not fall behind educationally while finishing his 8th-grade year remotely and preparing to enter high school in the fall. Near the end of the summer, Elliott moved into a non-relative's resource home and had a new caseworker take over his case prior to the start of his freshman year of high school. Unfortunately, in many situations, children in foster care have multiple caseworkers throughout their time in care. Elliott would remain in his placement for over a year while his family continued to engage in court-ordered services and participated in family visitations in order to repair and rebuild their relationships. However, given some ongoing concerns from the youth and service providers, including CASA for Children, it was determined that it was in Elliott's best interest to move placements.

THE POWER OF A CASA: A TEEN STORY



Through all of this, and with continued check-ins with his school counselor, Elliott was able to keep up with his classes and maintain a strong grade point average. A new placement was identified, and Elliott could transition seamlessly to his new placement. In addition, he could maintain all of his services, such as therapy, skills training, and tutoring. With the help of his CASA, these services, including transportation, continued without disruption. Around this time, Elliott was assigned yet another caseworker. Alex was able to connect with them and bring them up to speed with important background information, historical knowledge of the case, and her inclusive perspective as Elliott's court appointed special advocate.





Throughout this time, Elliott consistently increased his contact with his family, and eventually, with the support of CASA for Children, the Oregon Department of Health and Human Services, and the resource parents, Elliott was able to move to in-person visitation with his parents. Although there were times when it seemed like the team might need to explore alternative permanency plans, with Alex's ongoing connection with Elliott, he was able to understand that Elliott was ready and voicing his desire to return home. Alex suggested that ODHS take another look at the viability of this plan. Given the progress of his parents and the case, in addition to Elliott's continued success in school and with his therapist, ODHS and CASA for Children were able to support this reunification plan. It was official - Elliott was moving back home with his parents!

Following Elliott's return to the care of his parents, Alex was able to visit a few times to ensure that the services in place continued when he moved home, his school transfer was seamless, and he was feeling supported, safe, happy, and healthy. Alex, Elliott's CASA, supported him in his right to be heard, respected, and to have a say in the trajectory of his life. This goal was successfully reached and the case was closed late last year.
